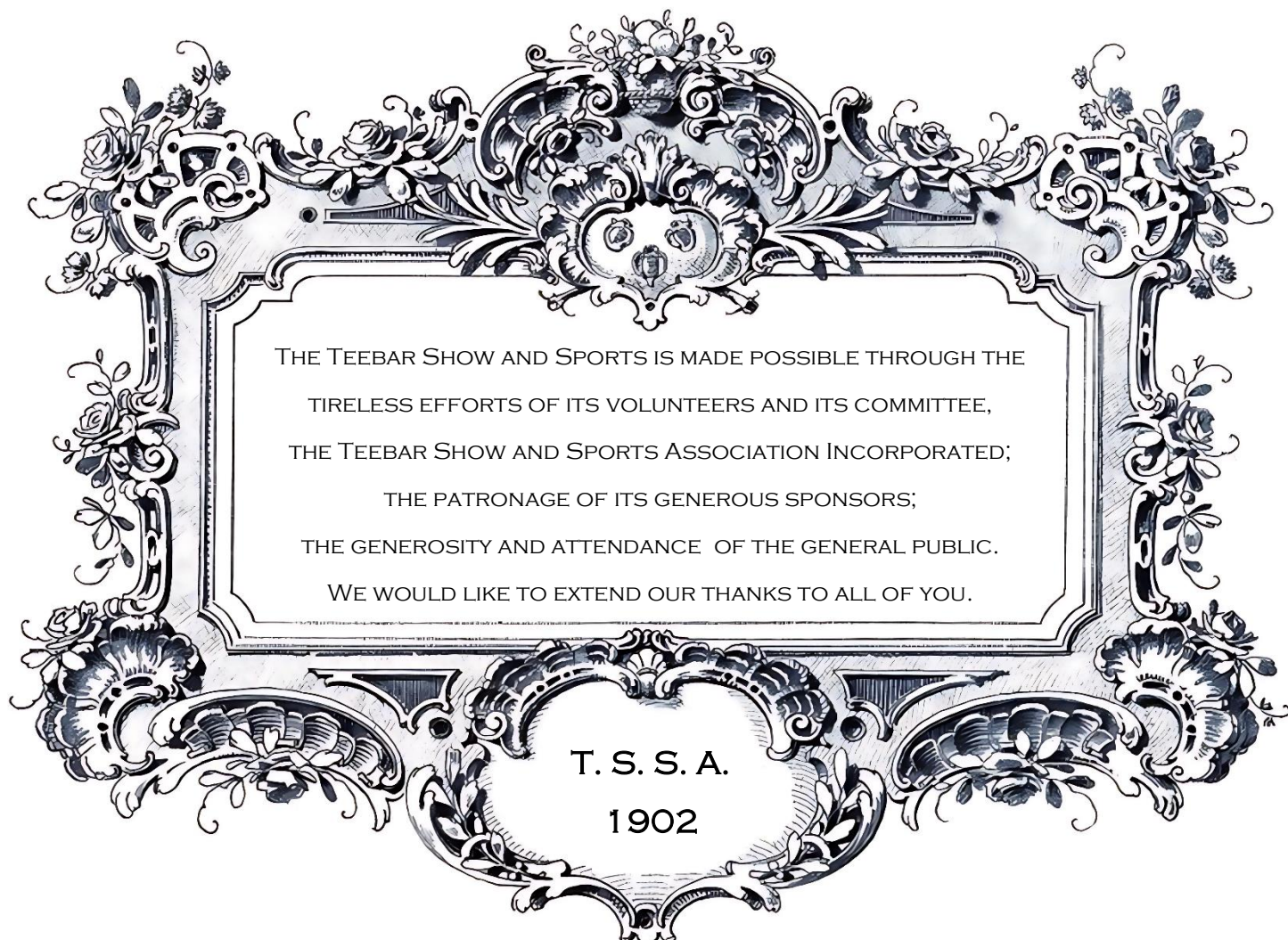

– LAURIE ELLIS MEMORIAL BULL RIDE –

The Teebar Show Rodeo Bull Ride is held in memory of Laurie Ellis, with the event winner receiving a commemorative trophy in his honour and an additional \$1,000 prize money which has been kindly donated by the Ellis Family.

Laurie was a dedicated volunteer, supporting the Teebar Show and Sports Association and local community. He was one of the first people to put his hand up to help in the Rodeo yards and was always there to lend a helping hand.

We are deeply honoured to hold this event in Laurie's memory.

FIREWORKS

At 7pm on Saturday, June 14, 2025 fireworks will be held at the Teebar Show and Rodeo, in the Campdraft Arena.

This marks a first for Teebar, and presents us with an eagerly anticipated precedent.

LOCATION

Teebar, first settled in 1849, is a historic farming community located 45 minutes west of Maryborough, 30 minutes east of Biggenden, and 80 minutes north-west of Gympie. The area takes its name from the nearby Teebar Station, the run after which the area was named.

Teebar is a scenic landscape steeped in a rich and proud history, and is a place whose local people are generous, hospitable, and very hard-working. It is this determined spirit that has ensured that once a year for generations, people have been able to congregate far and wide to enjoy 'the Sports'.

Ever since its inception, Teebar Sports has been all about family entertainment and at its core it is about uniting the community. Over the decades, the event grew to include a Campdraft, Rodeo, and Show, and only in recent years has it grown to be so popular that the Show, Rodeo, and Campdraft have had to be separated.

The Teebar Show and Rodeo is scheduled for Saturday, June 14, 2025,

with the Campdraft scheduled to be held later in the year in September, 2025.

Since the very beginning, circa 1902, these events have been held in the exact same historic grounds on the banks of Hayesmere Lagoon, with the Hall being opened in 1918.

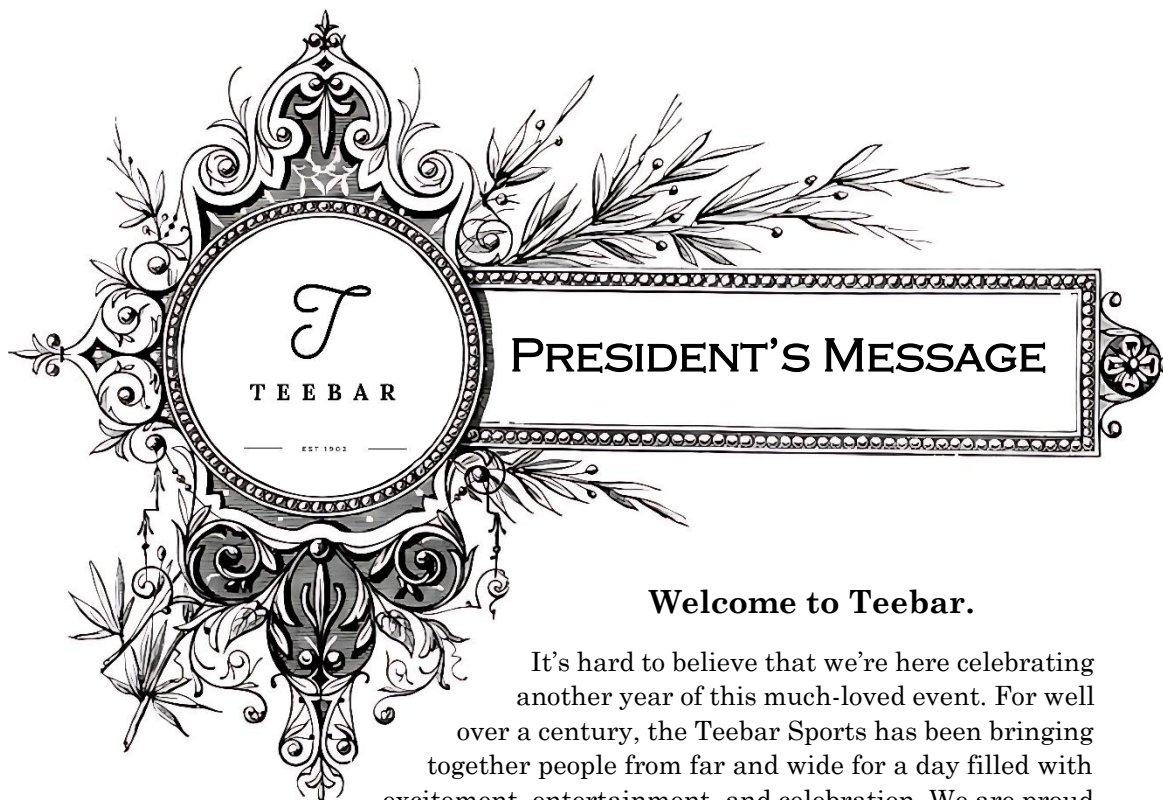

RURAL AMBASSADOR

The Queensland Rural Ambassador Awards, run by the Queensland Chamber of Agricultural Societies since 2003, is a leadership programme for 20 to 30-year-olds passionate about agriculture and their rural communities. It allows young people to promote Queensland, agriculture, rural communities and show societies, while providing an avenue for local communities and Agricultural Shows to recognise, celebrate and develop future leaders. It aims to develop future leaders by helping participants grow, network, and build confidence. Finalists typically have a strong commitment to their communities and deep involvement in Agricultural Shows.

SHOWGIRL

The Queensland Country Life Showgirl Awards celebrate over 40 years of empowering women in regional Queensland, promoting their leadership, community involvement, and professional development. Since 1983, the competition has encouraged young women to engage in local agricultural shows and has contributed to the sustainability of Queensland's agricultural traditions and given young women, statewide, the opportunity to engage in a leadership level with their local Agricultural Show. Showgirl, alongside other competitions like the Queensland Rural Ambassador Awards and Young Judges and Paraders Competition, are managed by the Queensland Chamber of Agricultural Societies, and aim to foster resilient women and boost youth participation in the Show movement. The event offers entrants personal growth, networking opportunities, and a chance to win the title of Queensland Country Life Showgirl. The winner will represent the Queensland Chamber of Agricultural Societies for a year.

- All exhibits are collected with prize money, between 3pm and 5pm on Saturday, June 14, 2025.
- Entries are the responsibility of the Owner to be collected and disposed. Under no circumstances will items be released for collection prior to this time.
- All Exhibits not collected by 5pm on Saturday, June 14, 2025, will be disposed, unless prior arrangements are made with the Hall Co-ordinator
- Refer to the Introduction of this Schedule for times when the Hall Co-ordinator will be available for accepting entries and the closing time for each section.
- All Stewards are to remain with their respective Sections during judging times and all other persons are asked to vacate the area. Hall entries are all priced at \$1.00 per entry, unless implicitly stated, the cost of which must accompany the entry form.

SPECIAL NOTES – Any Exhibit may be excluded from exhibition at the sole discretion of the supervising Steward. Any Exhibit may be removed to a more appropriate class at the sole discretion of the supervising Steward.

ALL COMPETITORS MUST PAY ENTRY FEE AT THE GATE ON THE DAY OF THE SHOW.

DURING THE SHOW WRISTBANDS MUST BE WORN AT ALL TIMES, OTHERWISE PATRONS RISK NO BAR SERVICE AND NO FOOD SERVICE, AND EVEN REMOVAL FROM THE EVENT.

All Alcoholic Beverages MUST BE consumed within the designated Bar Area as a matter of law, under the Liquor Act 1992.

- All Exhibits must be produced by the Exhibitor, grown in their own property or lease.
- Exhibits will be judged in accordance with their excellence in the following points, e.g. perfection of forms, fitness of neck or taproot, as well as firmness and smoothness of skin, solidity, weight, and size. Such characteristics as an experienced Judge would select as the truest and most perfect representation of the variety best suited to keeping as seed stock or sending to table for use. These factors, rather than size, are the preferred method by which Exhibits are judged.
- Exhibits will be cut by the Judge.

- All blooms must be grown or cut by the Exhibitor from their own property or lease.
- Bottles for exhibiting flowers will be those supplied by the Association, no other vessel may be used.
- Exhibits will be judged in accordance with their excellence in the following points, e.g. perfection of form, structure, utilisation and knowledge of floral composition. Such characteristics as an experienced Judge would select as the truest and most perfect representation of decorative artistry within this art form.

HOME MANUFACTURE – Section III – Division A – Preserves

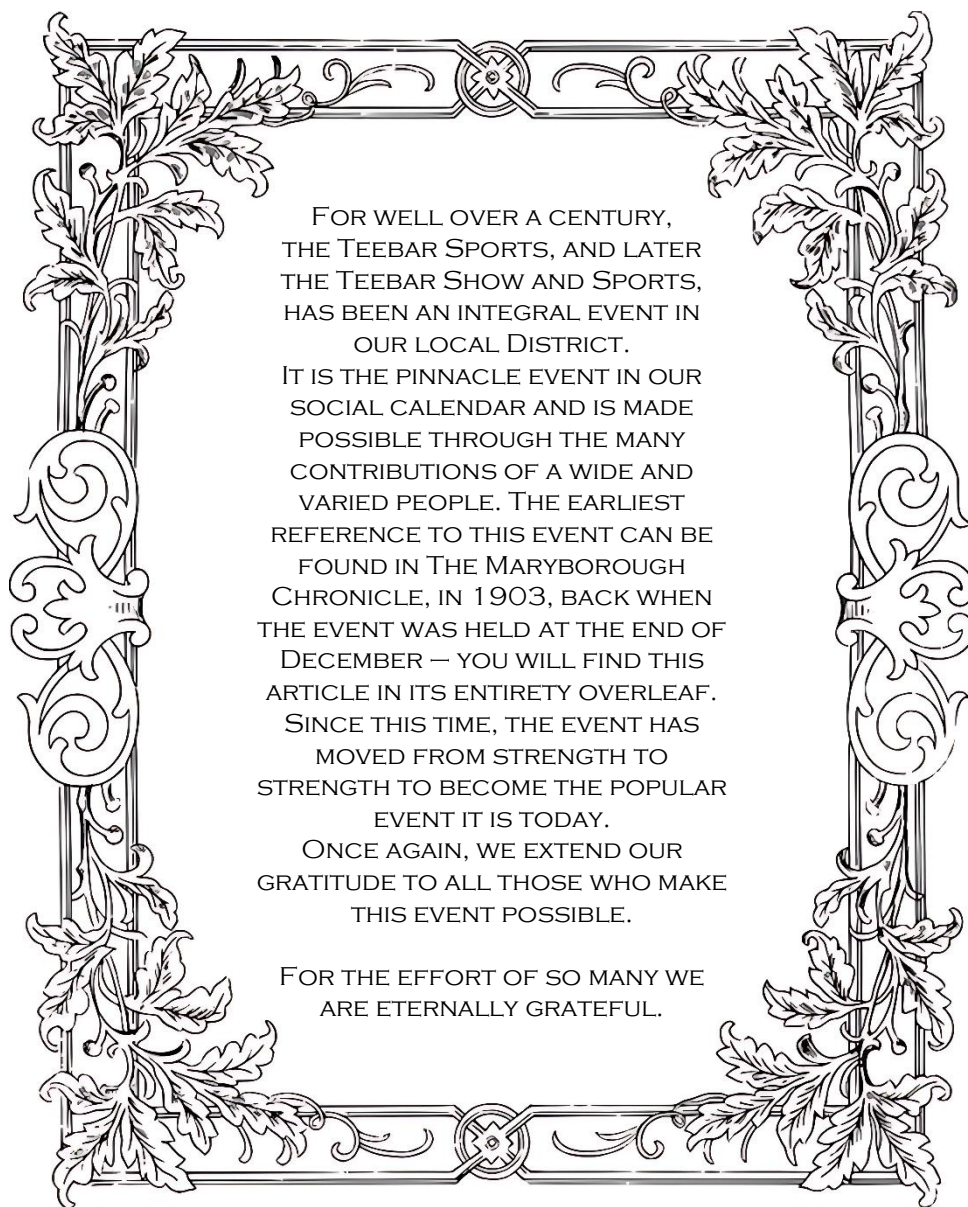

THE TEEBAR SPORTS.

A sports meeting was held here on 29th of December, and proved a conspicuous success. The committee are to be congratulated upon the “up-to-date” style in which they carried out to the programme, particularly our worthy Secretary, who must have worked hard to bring about such a result. The morning broke bright and cheerful, with every promise of a cool day, which sent a thrill of gladness to the hearts of those out for a day’s enjoyment, but unfortunately as the morning advanced the heat became unbearable, which combined the the pertinacious flies, made matters rather unpleasant. However, when the first event was run-off about 10 o’clock a considerable crowd had assembled on the grounds, which was greatly augmented during the afternoon. Mr. J. Foster, of Biggenden, had the booth and seemed by his “smiling countenance” to be doing a brisk trade.

The officers were as follows: — Patron, John Eaton, Esq.; President, R. Maitland, Esq.; Vice-presidents, Messrs. J. Kennedy, Thos. Lutteral, J. Foster, A. Ezzy, J. McTaggart, W. Bates; Judges, Messrs. J. Thompson and W. Hayes; Starter, G. Loche, Esq.; Handicappers, Messrs. A. Maitland, J. Thompson, W. M. Kennedy; Master of Track, D. M. J. Hayes; Treasurer and Secretary, W. M. Kennedy.

The spot chosen was an ideal one, overlooking the Hayesmere Lagoons, whose banks are verdant with pastures, and since the late rains the country around the recreation grounds presents a picturesque appearance, and there being a large number of ladies present in summer attire the scene was in every respect a pleasing one. Some fifteen events were run off, several of which were most exciting. Some splendid jumping

was witnessed in the high jump, Kennedy clearing five feet eleven inches, afterwards giving an exhibition jump of six feet which he just rapped. The buckjumping contest was the exciting event on the programme, and brought forth three competitors. The first to show a seat was Jimmy Burns, who hails from the sandy banks of the Maranoa, and is known far and wide for his daring feats of horsemanship. The crowd at once gathered round when it was known that Burns was to ride “Callaghan’s Colt,” a noted buckjumper; who has the reputation of unseating several first-class riders. With the ease and grace of a man that’s used to the game, he sprang into the saddle, and freely used both whip and spur until the claret flowed freely from Callaghan’s sides. The next to show his hand was Tod McCaulley, of Gympie, a promising young horseman, who rides in a fearless manner, his mount being a big roach-backed colt, who bucked in a determined manner, but like the first failed to unseat his rider. The third was Bert Nash, on a bay pony, who showed very tricky and quick work, unfortunately unseating her rider, who luckily escaped. When the mare was caught she was ridden to a finish by Tommy Hayes with spurs and whip. The judges in the event deciding on a tie, the riders divided.

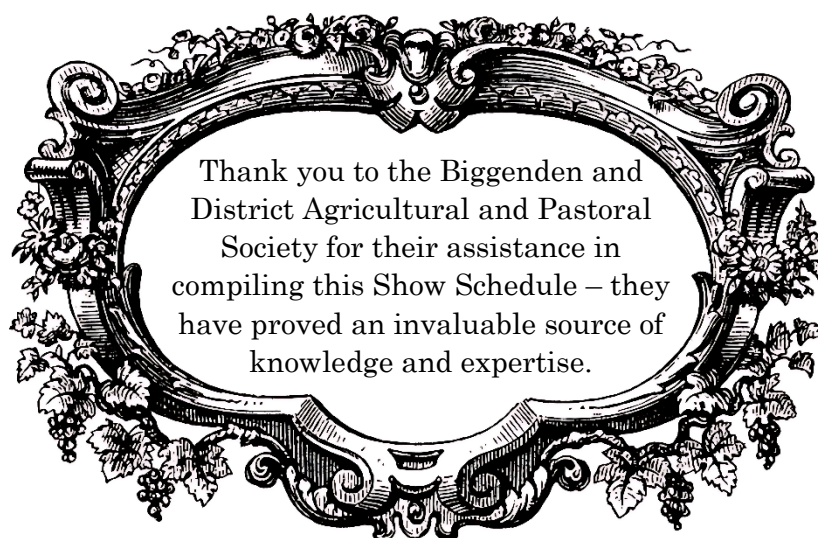
